

Supporting your students academically and emotionally.









ALOP Student Benefits:

- 1:1 and group mentoring.
- Consistent positive engagement.
- Weekly check-ins plus day-by-day support as needed.
- Personalized goal setting partnering with the student, teacher and/or social worker to set goals that will enable the student for a successful school year.
- Social emotional support Student Advocate will create a plan that helps student identify ways to overcome barriers to their school success.
- Conflict resolution.
- Monitoring student attendance and academic progress.
- Homework/Executing Functioning support.
- Coaching effective communication and decision-making skills.
- Connecting with opportunities to attend summer school and after school programming.







Student Success Plans and Individualized Optional Education Plans (SSPs/IOEPs)

- All students enrolled in Alternative Learning programs will have a written SSP, while all students enrolled in TAOEP or RSSP will have a written IOEP.
- Staff meets with each student in their caseload to create (SMART) goals.
- These goals are focused on areas of concern:
 - Attendance
 - o Grades
 - Social-emotional
 - Behavioral
- One of the main goals is based on the reason of referral.
- Admin., Teacher, Coach, student, and family members meet to develop and discuss progress on goals.



How Often Are Students **Progress-Monitored?**

- ALOP advocates evaluate each student's progress daily, weekly, monthly, and quarterly using a variety of data in accordance with each Student Success Plan. This includes, but is not limited to
 - Establishing baseline data.
 - Monitoring attendance, academic progress, behavior incidents.
 - Progress-monitoring for individual goal setting.
- Upon request, ROE 21 will provide
 - Student attendance reports.
 - Academic reports.
 - Student/family contact data.
 - SSP/IOEP goal progress.
 - Other general ALOP, TAOEP and RSSP information.

Who is eligible by law?

All children and youth who don't have a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, such as those living:

- In an emergency or transitional shelter, with friends or relatives due to loss of housing or economic hardship (also known as doubled up.)
- In a motel, hotel, campground, car, bus or train station or other public place, an abandoned building.
- In inadequate accommodations, such as no utilities or running water, no working kitchen, infestations/mold/vermin, number of bodies vs. beds
- As an Unaccompanied Youth, including youth who are not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian.

We invite you to join us for our upcoming fall training focusing on the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act. These sessions are designed to equip educators, counselors, social workers, coaches, nurses, and community agencies with the knowledge and tools necessary to support McKinney-Vento eligible students in our schools.

The McKinney-Vento Act plays a critical role in ensuring that homeless students have access to the same educational opportunities as their peers, helping to eliminate barriers to their academic success. As Homeless Education And Resource Team (HEART) members, we advocate for education equity, it is our shared responsibility to understand and uphold the rights of these vulnerable students.

Our comprehensive training will cover essential topics, including the identification of homeless students, their rights under the McKinney-Vento Act, and effective strategies for overcoming barriers to their education. By coming together to deepen our understanding, we can better serve the needs of all students.

We are pleased to offer four training sessions at various dates and locations throughout the area:

- 1. September 4th in Grayville
- 2. September 5th in Marion
- 3. September 19th in Murphysboro
- 4. September 24th in Centralia

Whether you're a McKinney-Vento liaison, a teacher, a secretary, or a community agency, your participation in these trainings is crucial. Together, as members of the Homeless Education And Resource Team (HEART), we can make a meaningful impact on the lives of our most vulnerable students.
